When God seems Idle (or "God, are you there? Do you hear me? Do you Care?) Habakkuk 1

Context - Habakkuk lived (somewhere around 630 B.C. - 598 B.C.) during the final days of the Southern Kingdom of Judah and warned of the coming judgment on the nation through Babylon. He was praying hard for the revival of his nation when God answered him with a very unexpected answer.

Background -

- 1. It is believed that he was a Levite- and perhaps one of the temple singers. "From the liturgical nature of both parts of the book, especially the second part, it has been inferred that he was a cultic prophet on the staff of the Jerusalem Temple—perhaps even one of the temple Singers." (Bruce 832 Minor Prophets)
- 2. He grew up in the Southern Kingdom of Judah during the reign of the good king Josiah.
- 3. He ministered in Judah during the reign of the evil king Jehoiakim. Jehoiakim was charged with injustice, covetousness, murder, oppression, and violence by Jeremiah (Jeremiah 22:13-19).
