The Five Sola's: Sola Scriptura (The Bible Alone) 2 Timothy 3:14-17

Sola Scriptura — A Latin phrase meaning "Scripture alone." The phrase reflects a key principle of the Reformation, the idea that Scripture alone is authoritative for Christian doctrine, not Scripture plus church tradition. Douglas Mangum, The Lexham Glossary of Theology (Bellingham, WA: Lexham Press, 2014).

The doctrine of Sola Scripture (The Bible Alone) will cause you to	
1.	the Bible's full inspiration (vs. 16a)
A.	Breathed out by God translates a Greek word (theopneustos) that does not occur in any other Greek text (biblical or otherwise) prior to this letter. (ESV Study Bible) The word appears to be a created word by Paul: Theo = God, Neustos = Breathed.
B.	This one word teaches us the doctrines of Inspiration (The Bible is God's Word, Inerrancy (The Bible contains no errors), and Infallibility (It cannot err in guiding you).
2.	to its instruction (vs. 16b)
A.	The Bible is profitable for: Teaching: (didaskilia) a focus on sound doctrine so as to be able to detect and refute false teaching. Rebuking: reproof for wrong behavior or wrong belief. Correction : the restoration of something to its proper condition. Training in Righteousness: Instruction in Godliness.
3. _	prepared for the Work of God (vs.17)
A.	Verse 17 teaches the doctrine of the sufficiency of Scripture, the idea that the truth contained in the Bible is sufficient in all matters pertaining to doctrine and moral behavior.
B.	Complete (Artios): To become capable to do everything one is called to

do (McArthur) To become useful or suitable for a task. Equipped

(Exertisminos): To be completely furnished for God's work.
